Congratulations to all our winners and well done to all the children for the fantastic co-operation and enthusiasm for Maths. Remember to 'open your Maths Eyes' and see that Maths is all around us in our natural environment.

<u>Mathematics Tables</u> – all children in 4<sup>th</sup>, 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> class should know their multiplication and division tables off by rote in much the same way as they know the alphabet O Parents, please ensure your child knows his/her tables. Please check regularly by asking your child various calculations. This could be done whilst driving in the car for example. Simply give your child a few tables to answer e.g. 4x7=, 8x9=, 96/8= etc. As always we value your support in helping us help your child to learn.

Failure to know their multiplication/division tables off by heart, will have a negative impact on your child's confidence and understating in the senior cycle of school i.e. 5<sup>th</sup>/6<sup>th</sup> Class. If he/she does not know their table fluently, they will struggle to work at the higher level required when working on life skill topics such as 'fractions, decimals and percentages'.

<u>Sing Out Loud</u> - We are very busy preparing for our 'Sing Out Loud' concert, which will take place on November 18<sup>th</sup> in the Wexford Opera house. We have 32 children participating in the concert, where we will be performing over 40 songs.

A special thank you and acknowledgement goes to Ms. Lawlor and Ms. Sheehan for all their hard work and dedication in preparing the children for this wonderful event. We look forward to the big night. Please note that the Opera House receives 100% of the ticket price with no monies being earned by the school from this event.

## Report from Ms. Pitt's 3<sup>rd</sup>/4<sup>th</sup> Class ©

We recently completed fantastic projects about Australia. The children are presenting their projects to the class over the next couple of weeks. They are sharing with their fellow students the information that they have learnt where they got the information and their favourite parts of their project. The other children in their class then get the opportunity to ask them questions about their project. This is a great confidence building exercise for them.

In English this month we have been focusing on narrative writing. The children have been learning how to structure a narrative piece of writing: using a title, orientation, complication and resolution in their writing. They first plan their writing in the form of a brainstorm and then plan the four parts of their narrative pieces. They have written some great stories so far.

In 3<sup>rd</sup> Class maths we have been learning about data. The children have been learning how to analyse bar charts and pictograms. We have been surveying and drawing our own bar charts and pictograms in groups also. We have also been playing different maths games and learning a very catchy 'Three Times Tables' song for maths week.

### Report from Mr. Murphy's 4<sup>th</sup>/5<sup>th</sup> Class ©

It has been another interesting month in our classroom. In October we started to delve more into the world around us. We have been learning about the countries that make up Scandinavia and where to find them on a map. We have been investigating how plants grow and the legacy of Leonardo Da Vinci.

In Art, we have been creating, using the theme of Scandinavia and chalk to create images of a scene of an Aurora Borealis on the Scandinavian landscape. We have also spent the past month learning about recount writing and its various forms. We also began to work on our fractured fairy tales where the children changed up some old fairy tales with their own ideas for a newer generation. We have also been reading the novel 'Millions' by Frank Cotterell Boyce, learning about moral choices and various saints along the way.

### Report from Mrs. Brophy's 5<sup>th</sup>/6<sup>th</sup> Class ©

We've done a lot of work in the senior class this month. Our history focus was on 'The French Revolution' with particular focus on how Irishman Daniel O'Connell was appalled by the violence he witnessed there, which in turn impacted how he approached his goal of 'liberation' for Ireland from the British. We shall be studying 'The Liberator' in full detail next month.

In literacy we studied descriptive writing and the four stages of this genre – title, introduction, characteristics and evaluation. The children wrote very interesting pieces on 'Storm Ophelia' and her effects on Ballymurn. We shall be starting our first novel 'The Silver Sword' by Ian Serraillier after the mid-term break.

We learnt all the lakes, rivers and county town/cities of Ireland in geography and began looking at transport in Ireland. We continued our investigation of 'heat' in science. Maths - 5<sup>th</sup> Class have been learning 'long division' this month. They are quite confident working on this concept.

### SUPERVISION - Your Child's Safety on School Premises

Monday to Friday ------ 9.20am to 3.00pm Infants (Junior & Senior) ------ 9.20am to 2.00pm Outside of these times there is **no supervision** for children on the school premises.

Under the Education (Welfare) Act, 2000, parents are responsible for making sure their child receives an education. The law also says that every child between the ages of 6 and 16 must attend school or otherwise receive an education. Most children attend recognised schools although some are educated at home or in non-recognised schools

The school must tell the statutory Educational Welfare Services of the Child and Family Agency if your child has missed 20 days or more in the school year, or if it is concerned that your child is missing too much school. This can include days when your child leaves school early on a regular basis.

Taking a holiday during term time means that children miss important school time. It will be difficult for them to catch up on work later on. As a result, they may fall behind with school work and lose confidence in their abilities. The BOM of Ballymurn NS strongly advises that parents do not take their children out of school for holidays during term time.
