<u>Maths Week</u>: huge thanks to Ms. Lawlor and all the teachers. We had another wonderful 'Maths Week' here at Ballymurn NS. The children had lots of fun participating in different games and events. Three maths competitions were held whereby the staff and children had to estimate how many matchsticks and monkey nuts were in various containers. The results were as follows:

Congratulations to all our winners and well done to all the children for the fantastic co-operation and enthusiasm for Maths. Remember to 'open your Maths Eyes' and see that Maths is all around us in our natural environment.

<u>Mathematics Tables</u> – all children in 4^{th} , 5^{th} and 6^{th} class should know their multiplication and division tables off by rote in much the same way as they know the alphabet \odot Parents, please ensure your child knows his/her tables. Please check regularly by asking your child various calculations. This could be done whilst driving in the car for example. Simply give your child a few tables to answer e.g. $4\times7=$, $8\times9=$, 72/8= etc. As always we value your support in helping us help your child to learn.

Failure to know their multiplication/division tables off by heart, will have a negative impact on your child's confidence and understating in the senior cycle of school i.e. $5^{th}/6^{th}$ Class. If he/she does not

know their table fluently, they will struggle to work at the higher level required when working on life skill topics such as 'fractions, decimals and percentages'.

We realise that in secondary school children are using calculators from the beginning of 1^{st} Year, however, there is no replacement for 'quick mental maths' which we should all have at our 'finger tips'. Knowing our mathematical tables fluently greatly helps with this. The learning of addition, subtraction, multiplication and division tables is set out in the Mathematics Curriculum and is compulsory to be taught in school.

 $\underline{Sing\ Out\ Loud}$ - We are very busy preparing for our 'Sing Out Loud' concert, which will take place on November 22^{nd} in the Wexford Opera house. We have 28 children participating in the concert, where we will be performing over 40 songs.

A special thank you and acknowledgement goes to Ms. Lawlor and Ms. Sheehan for all their hard work and dedication in preparing the children for this wonderful event. We look forward to the big night. Please note that the Opera House receives 100% of the ticket price with no monies being earned by the school from this event.

Report from Ms. Lawlor's Junior/Senior Infant Class ©

Our Aistear theme for October was Halloween and autumn so the Infants have been busy learning all about it. We enjoyed a nature walk where the children looked for signs of autumn. Our role-play area was transformed into a Witch's house. The children have been writing down their bubbling potion recipes and made all the teachers drink them! They practised their magic spells also and made special witch dinners. They made amazing constructions such as brooms, cats, spiders and cauldrons with the plasticine also. We read some autumn themed stories and we especially enjoyed Winnie the Witch books.

Junior Infants have learned their first group of letter sounds and are already beginning to read and write simple words. During Maths Week we played a teddy bear number game and we made some patterns using different coloured paints.

Junior and Senior Infants have been learning all about Oíche Shamna in Irish. They know a lovely Irish song which they could sing for you! They also learned the rhymes Five Little Pumpkins and Witch Witch so hopefully they can perform these at Halloween!! Have a lovely mid-term break!

Report from Ms. Ormonde's 1st/2nd Class ©

We have had so much fun in school for the past month. Our Aistear theme was Halloween and our role play area was set up as a costume shop. We loved trying on the different costumes and buying and selling them to our friends. We wrote lots of spooky stories at our writing station and we even made our own slime at the investigation table.

In English we have been learning about narrative writing. We have written lots of narratives and we made sure to include a beginning, middle and end. In maths, our stations each week have been going great. We have been solving problems, playing board games and answering challenging sums on the interactive whiteboard.

We have had a great month and are already looking forward to November!

Report from Ms. Pitt's 3rd/4th Class ©

October has been another busy month. We recently had maths week, which the children thoroughly enjoyed. We were learning about data in maths that week. The children worked in small groups and created tallies based on the surveys that they did in the different classes. They then worked together to create bar charts to display their survey results.

We also did some maths problem solving and riddles in class. The children also enjoyed doing some matchstick puzzles which really got them thinking. They also worked in small groups to do a maths trail around the school. Well done to Eimear Devlin in 3^{rd} Class who won the senior school's estimation challenge set by Ms. Lawlor. She even beat all the teachers! \odot

In English we have been learning about narrative writing this month. We have read some examples of narrative stories. We also discussed the three main parts of a narrative story; the orientation, complication and resolution. We then planned and wrote a story together as a class using those three stages. The children then went on to plan and write their own narrative pieces. We have been writing drafts before publishing our final pieces. I have enjoyed reading some great stories.

In SPHE we have been learning about fire safety. We investigated the common dangers that are found in our homes and came up with some fire safety rules to follow. We also looked at different actions and possible consequences to different fire-related scenarios. These all got the children thinking and made them more fire safety aware.

Report from Ms. Morrissey's 5th Class ©

It has been an action packed month for us! In maths we have had lots of fun especially with the busy activities during Maths Week. We have been undertaking lots of group tasks, problem solving, maths trails, tricky puzzles and estimation tasks. The kids have been working very well in groups working together to solve the problem.

In SESE we have been learning about the Solar System and also about how global warming is changing planet Earth. We didn't realise the small ways in which we can help to reduce this in our day to day life!

In art Ms. Morrissey has really enjoyed seeing the creative pieces of art that the children have created using print techniques. We used materials such as cotton buds, string, sponges of different shapes and sizes, corrugated card and even our fingers and hand prints!

Report from Mrs. Brophy's 6th Class ©

We've done a lot of work in the senior class this month. Our geography focus was on 'Business and Industry' with particular focus on how local businesses employ local people and keep jobs in our community. We went on a tour of Hentech Fabrication on Tuesday 23rd to see a 'live' business in operation. The children have been learning new vocabulary like permanent, temporary, migrant employees, profit and loss in terms of running a business. We also looked at the 9 types of discrimination that employers must be aware of when recruiting and managing employees i.e. gender, race, religion, marital status, orientation, age. Sincere thanks to John Hennessy for providing us with the opportunity to visit his business.

In literacy we studied procedural writing and the four stages of this genre - title, goal, materials and steps. The children wrote their own procedural recipes in both English and Irish. The children have also been studying poetry and have five poems learnt off by heart. We are also still reading our novel

'Wonder' and have been learning about 'Precepts'. The children wrote their own precept definitions also, some of which you can read below:

'During life you may get gifts, but love is the only gift you need' by Jennifer Réamonn
'Sometimes it's good to start over.' by Sophie Cummins

'If you don't have people around you that love you, then you won't find happiness. Love is what makes people happy and is what you need during a hard time' by Amy Fortune

Maths - we have been revising 'long division', angles and lines this month. The children learnt that corresponding and opposite angles are equal, how to construct triangles and how to measure and draw angles. We also began studying 'Fractions' which we shall continue in November.

SUPERVISION - Your Child's Safety on School Premises

Monday to Friday ------ 9.20am to 3.00pm
Infants (Junior & Senior) ----- 9.20am to 2.00pm
Outside of these times there is **no supervision** for children on the school premises.

Under the Education (Welfare) Act, 2000, parents are responsible for making sure their child receives an education. The law also says that every child between the ages of 6 and 16 must attend school or otherwise receive an education. Most children attend recognised schools although some are educated at home or in non-recognised schools

The school must tell the statutory Educational Welfare Services of the Child and Family Agency if your child has missed 20 days or more in the school year, or if it is concerned that your child is missing too much school. This can include days when your child leaves school early on a regular basis.

Taking a holiday during term time means that children miss important school time. It will be difficult for them to catch up on work later on. As a result, they may fall behind with school work and lose confidence in their abilities. It is also extremely disruptive to their classmates and teacher when absent pupils miss various concepts being taught e.g. new maths topics, Irish verbs etc. due to holidays.

Teachers <u>will not</u> be providing work to children who are going on holidays during the academic year. It is the sole responsibility of parents to organise for their child to 'catch up' on missed school work.

The BOM of Ballymurn NS strongly advises that parents do not take their children out of school for holidays during term time.
