Reading Tips for Older Readers (7yrs - 12yrs)

1. Listen to your child reading

It's still really important that your child continues to <u>read aloud to you</u> daily as part of his/her homework and this may or may not be from levelled books, depending on how well their reading is coming along. The emphasis will be on reading fluently and with expression, understanding more complex plots and broadening their vocabulary as well as building an understanding of how punctuation and grammar are used. Want to know more about levelled reading books?

2. Use book talk

Continue to talk about reading in its widest sense (stories, favourite authors and illustrators, series, different types of books including poetry, plays, non-fiction and reference materials, comics and magazines). Join book clubs, public libraries and online forums to discover the wider reading community together.

3. Check understanding

Whatever your child is reading it's good to check that they are grasping the deeper levels of meaning (why things happen or how things work). Ask them to tell you about what they are reading, retell parts of the story, explain a specific section or make connections. Don't forget to explore words and vocabulary with your child too, using dictionaries in print or online.

And most importantly, continue to enjoy what you do together, give lots of encouragement and expand the reading experience to keep your child switched on. Don't forget - if they are reading something they are not enjoying, it's OK to read something else. Reading has really got to be a pleasant experience if you want your child to keep reading.

Ms Lawlor's Junior and Senior Infant Report ©

What a busy month we've had settling back into school! Our new Junior Infants have settled in very well. They've been learning the new routines of school life such as lining up, putting rubbish in the correct bin, tidying up and lifting their chairs quietly! The Senior Infants have been showing them great example as they are now the oldest children in the class!

Our Aistear theme this month has been 'My family'. The children have been talking about their families a lot. In the home corner they've been busy pretending to be Mammy, Daddy brother or sister. They've been preparing meals, feeding the baby, ironing, fixing household things, setting the table, hanging clothes on the line and lots more!

In Maths, the Junior Infants have been matching and sorting objects. The Senior Infants have been revising their numbers 1-5. We picked some apples from our school garden trees and we are also looking forward to a classroom visit this week. We are lucky to be meeting a family pet, a puppy! Ms. Redmond's 1st/2nd Class Report ©

Here in the first and second class room we are all well settled back in to school after enjoying a lovely summer. This month we worked really hard and learned lots of interesting things. We learnt all

about the famous author Hans Christian Andersen and discussed some of the well-known fairy tales he wrote. We painted pictures of 'The Ugly Duckling'.

We are learning all about the human body and how we can keep our bodies healthy and fit. We are doing laps of the school each day for the past week, along with all the other classes, to help us keep active and healthy.

Ms. Pitt's 3rd/4th Class Report ©

3rd and 4th Class have settled back into school very well. They have been working hard and are managing well with the step up to the new class level. We have been learning about Australia this month in class. We have learned about the states, cities, school system, animals, flag, physical features and much more. The children are now busily working on their individual projects which look great so far. I look forward to reading them and seeing the presentations in the coming weeks.

In 3rd Class maths we have been learning about time recently, we did lots of work with the clocks in class telling the analogue and digital times shown. Please continue to work on the topic of time; questioning your children about what time it is in both digital and analogue time whenever possible. We have also been learning about lines and angles in maths. We have been investigating parallel, horizontal and vertical lines. We did a maths trail searching for examples of the different types of lines in real life around the school.

Mr. Murphy's 4th/5th Class Report ©

It's been a busy month for our class as we have gotten back into the routine of school. September has seen a great start to the year and we have done lots of interesting work already. This month we have been learning the counties of Ireland and where to find them on a map. Also, further afield we have been looking into at the Mysterious Maya in Central America.

In art, we have been creating using the theme of autumn, and particularly trees and leaves. We have also spent the past month debating as a class using our persuasive writing skills to promote our opinions on various topics. We have researched various topics this month using iPods on loan from the Wexford Education Centre, where the children have been working on various displays on plants and animals.

Mrs. Brophy's 5th/6th Class Report ©

We have been super busy in the senior class this month and learning lots of new things. Our history focus was on 'The Tudors' and how the Reformation impacted on life in Ireland. The children enjoyed learning about Henry VIII and his many wives, Sir Francis Drake and Elizabeth I. In literacy we studied recount writing and the four stages of this genre - title, orientation, sequence of events and personal comment.

We learnt all the counties, rivers and mountains of Ireland in geography and conducted several science experiments investigating how heat works. We looked at conduction, convection and radiation of heat. Using metal, plastic and wood, we observed which was the best conductor of heat and catalogued our results.

Report by Ms. Pitt

This year we hope to take part in the Active School Flag' initiative. There are four components involved in the process: Physical Education, Physical Activity, Partnerships and Active Schools Week. Upon initial self-evaluation we will be focusing on improving these four areas within our school in the coming year. We will be developing a section on our school website which will document our work for the 'Active School Flag', please visit the website to see more information in the coming weeks.

This week as part of European Week of Sport all of the children in school are participating in a running initiative the 'Run Around Europe Challenge'. Eight laps around the school equals 1km. Each day this week; all of the children are running laps of the school with the aim to run at least 1km a day. The class teachers are recording the numbers of laps ran in total by their class each day and then convert it to kilometres.

We hope that by the end of the week we will reach a European capital city when we total the kilometres that the children have run throughout the week. London is 597km away; we hope to have run that distance or more by the end of the week. We are also going to participate in a 'Take on the Teachers Challenge' on Friday of this week. Some of the children will be taking on the teachers in an active challenge on Friday.
