Reading Tips for Older Readers (7yrs - 12yrs)

1. Listen to your child reading

It's still really important that your child continues to <u>read aloud to you</u> daily as part of his/her homework and this may or may not be from levelled books, depending on how well their reading is coming along. The emphasis will be on reading fluently and with expression, understanding more complex plots and broadening their vocabulary as well as building an understanding of how punctuation and grammar are used. Want to know more about levelled reading books?

2. Use book talk

Continue to talk about reading in its widest sense (stories, favourite authors and illustrators, series, different types of books including poetry, plays, non-fiction and reference materials, comics and magazines). Join book clubs, public libraries and online forums to discover the wider reading community together.

3. Check understanding

Whatever your child is reading it's good to check that they are grasping the deeper levels of meaning (why things happen or how things work). Ask them to tell you about what they are reading, retell parts of the story, explain a specific section or make connections. Don't forget to explore words and vocabulary with your child too, using dictionaries in print or online.

And most importantly, continue to enjoy what you do together, give lots of encouragement and expand the reading experience to keep your child switched on. Don't forget - if they are reading something they are not enjoying, it's OK to read something else. Reading has really got to be a pleasant experience if you want your child to keep reading.

Ms Lawlor's Junior and Senior Infant Report ©

Our new Junior Infants have settled in to school life with ease! They are very busy learning our classroom promises and routines. The children are practising holding their pencils and making lots of marks and drawings on paper. In Aistear time our theme has been about our families and our homes. The children have been using the new language they've learned during their playtime. Our role-play area was transformed into the home corner where the children have been busy cooking dinners, ironing, matching socks and lots more! In Irish we are also learning the words that belong to the home e.g. caréid, prátaí, cistin, cuntar.

Ms. Ormonde's 1st/2nd Class Report ©

We have had a fantastic start to the year in 1^{st} and 2^{nd} Class. We were all really excited to see our friends after the summer holidays. 1^{st} Class have settled into their new classroom well and we also welcomed two new boys to our class, Jack and Louie.

This year we have started 'Aistear' in our class. This has proved a huge success with the children. This month we explored the theme of the estate agents where we bought and sold houses in our role play area. We made houses from cardboard, lollipop sticks and other pieces of junk art, we played with playdough, we played with Snow White's cottage and we made houses from Lego. We also learned lots about the different types of houses both in the past and nowadays. We even went on a Ballymurn walk to see what kind of houses there are in our own village.

The mobile library is back again this year and 1^{st} Class really enjoyed taking books out for the first time. We have a new reading corner in our classroom where we have a tent and beanbag and we can enjoy some quiet time with a book. This area has proved popular with the children and it's great to see them reading so much. Keep up the great work!

Ms. Pitt's 3rd/4th Class Report ©

We have had a busy start to the year, in which we've been learning lots of new things. We have been busy learning about 'Mé Féin' in Irish. The children have learned phrases to describe themselves and their families. We also learned the poem 'An tOchtapas' and the song 'Mo Bhreithlá'. In art we have also been doing some artwork based on the theme of myself. The children did some imaginative drawings of themselves as minions. We also did some 'falling back in space' portraits where the children traced around their hands and feet on a large sheet and drew the rest of their body within the picture as if they were falling into space.

In history we were learning about schools in the past. We discussed about how schools were heated differently, the different punishments and the different resources used in schools in the past. The children did a questionnaire with their grandparents or an older person in which they asked about that person's experience about school in the past. It was very interesting to learn about how school has changed so much over time.

In maths we were learning about time. We did lots of games and activities, practised setting different times on the clocks and practised doing digital and analogue time. Time is one of the more difficult topics in maths and I would encourage the children to practise telling the time at home whenever possible.

Ms. Morrissey's 5th Class Report ©

In fifth class it has been a very busy start to the new school year. We have been busy reading lots of different narratives and writing stories of our own with a focus on adding SALT! (Similes, adjectives, lots of detail and transition words). The children love our new novel 'Wonder' which we are doing lots of work on!

In maths the pupils have been loving the number theory and exploring things like prime numbers, square and rectangular numbers. Children are also in the middle of project work based on the Renaissance period and an artist of their choice, which also inspired our beautiful artwork this month! The children loved experimenting with mirror writing just as Di Vinci used. It's been a busy few weeks in fifth class and Rackard League is also under way this week!

Mrs. Brophy's 6th Class Report ©

Our 6th Class have been very busy this month settling back into school. In English we have begun reading our novel 'Wonder' by R.J. Palacio and we are studying the narrative writing genre. The children have written three narratives, which they drafted, edited and are now published. In Maths we have covered Data, Place Value and are moving onto Multiplication. The Victorians and life in the 19th Century has been our topic for History this month.

In SPHE, the children created their own 'Identity Shields' and we have been talking about showing kindness to each other. Printing has been our Art theme and the children have experimented designing their own pictures using materials such as elastic bands, wool and a variety of fruit and vegetables. Tomorrow we shall be printing using cotton wool buds.

Finally, we have been learning 'Mé Féin' sna ceachtanna Gaeilge. Bhí na páistí ag cleachtadh ag caint lena chéile faoi 'mé féin'...cad is ainm duit? Cén aois thú? Cé mhéad daoine i do theaglach? srl. Tá siad ag foghlaim na briathra neamhrialta, ag déanamh filíocht 'An Fómhar', 'Táim Láidir' agus triail tuisceanna freisin. Tá siad ag obair go díon ©
