Athletics – all our children shall participate in a six week athletics programme, commencing 1st May. The athletics programme shall be taught by a qualified fitness coach. Each class shall run for one hour weekly. The entire cost per child shall be €6.

The Importance of Learning Tables -

- Tables are a basic essential for when learning mathematics. Children need to master them.
- Unless they do this, it will be difficult for the children to learn other aspects of maths.
- Addition and Subtraction Tables are taught in 1st and 2nd Class. They are revised in 2nd.
- Multiplication and Division are taught in 3rd and 4th Class.
- Regular revision of tables is part of the 5th and 6th Class curriculum

 $1^{st}/2^{nd}$ Class provides 'a window of opportunity' to learn addition/subtraction tables. It is important to master these tables by the end of 2^{nd} because:

- In 3rd and 4th Class the focus changes to multiplication and division.
- If a child knows their simple number facts then <u>they can give their full attention to</u> <u>methodology when being taught new maths.</u>

If the children have the answers to the tables at the tip of their tongue then they can concentrate on learning the methodology of new sums. The children who know their number facts speed through the math's worksheet in class. Teachers can teach the tables, but children really need to **learn them**. Tables are given as **homework**. Sometimes children think that homework of a 'learning off' type is less important than written homework. Learning tables is **very important**.

Learning tables needn't be done at the kitchen table. You can work on them with your child on the journey to and from school or while waiting in the supermarket queue © Knowing tables really helps when children are learning new sums. Children need to be able to rattle off their tables like they know their own name. Otherwise, though they understand how to do a sum, they make mistakes in simple addition or subtraction.

How Parents Can Help Their Child Memorise Their Tables.

- In 1st and 2nd Class we practice tables, in a concrete way, using lollipop sticks and unifix cubes. We also use the table book.
- In class we say 'one plus zero is one', 'one plus one is two' or 'six minus one is five', 'ten minus three is seven'
- Children learn in different ways. Many respond to working with concrete objects such as lollipop sticks, cubes, smarties.
- Some children learn best by singing or chanting their tables.
- For some, keeping track of their tables on their fingers (a kinaesthetic approach) helps.
- Let your children see, that you place value on learning tables and that you think tables are important.
- Show your child how quickly an answer should be arrived at by modelling your own mathematical knowledge.
- Find out what your child already knows.

Ms. Lawlor's Junior/Senior Infant Class Report

Our February Aistear theme was 'The Rainforest'. The children have been busy learning all about the different animals found there and other wild animals too! Thanks to all the children who brought their animals teddies in to school to make our rainforest a lot of fun to play in.

The children have been explorers and have been busy making huts, animals, trees, vines with the plasticine. In art they made a clay snake which will be painted next week. They also made a very colourful parrot. In science we did many fun experiments such as making a rainforest in a bottle. It is raining in our bottles at the moment which is helping the trees to grow! We also did an experiment to show that plant drink water through their stems.

Many thanks again to Dave Cummins for bringing us in some creatures from the rainforest! The children always learn so much from our classroom visitors.

Ms. Ormonde's 1st/2nd Class Report

February has been a fun month in 1st and 2nd Class. Our Aistear theme this month was 'Magic.' We wrote up a magic potion and we then used the materials to make this potion. There were lots of explosions happening and we really enjoyed mixing the ingredients. We have been learning to perform a variety of magic tricks and have been working on projecting our voices for an audience. We loved performing our magic show to the other classes and we are so looking forward to performing for our parents on Friday.

In maths we have learned a lot about fractions. We were working on halves and quarters in particular. This week we have started learning about capacity. The kids are really excited to be measuring with water and real life containers.

In English, we listened to the story 'Leon and the Place Between.' We used all of our comprehension strategies before, during and after reading. We were predicting, questioning, making connections and summarising. The kids are encouraged to use these strategies in their own reading as well.

Ms. Pitt's 3rd/4th Class Report

This month we have begun learning about the theme of 'An Teilifís' in Irish. The children have been learning lots of new vocabulary about the different types of TV programmes and phrases associated with the theme. We have been learning a poem 'An Teilifís' and the songs 'Óró 'Sé do Bheatha Bhaile' and TG Lurgan's song 'Abair Leat'.

In English we have been focusing on the genre of explanation writing. We looked at examples about 'How Rainbows are Formed', 'The Lifecycle of a Butterfly' and 'How Paper is Recycled'. We learned about how to structure a piece of explanation using a title, identifying statement, explanation sequence and summary statement. We also wrote explanation pieces together and individually.

In history we have been learning about 'The Incas'. The children learned about where they lived, the different groups in society, what they worked at and some of their inventions. The children worked together in groups to create a group project poster to display the information that they have learned about 'The Incas'. They found this era in history very interesting.

In maths we have been learning about 2D shapes, sequences and patterns, and symmetry. We learned how to identify and describe the characteristics of various 2D shapes such as their angles, sides, curved or straight lines, parallel lines and tessellation. In patterns and sequences the children learned how to recognise and continue various different sequences. In the topic of symmetry we created symmetry pictures, completed symmetrical flags and recognised if the shapes had horizontal, vertical or diagonal lines of symmetry.

Ms. Morrissey's 5th Class Report

We have been very busy this month and it really has flown by. In English we have been continuing to read and analyse the novel Goodnight Mister Tom. We covered some very exciting chapters before the break and the children are very keen to finish it to see how it ends.

We have also been revising recount writing and the children were excited to write all about their week off adventures.

In Maths we have been estimating and measuring lines and angles. We got to get out and about to find all sorts of angles around our school. Children were getting used to using protractors for the first time also. We had also been doing a lot of work on problem solving strategies and length! In Music children are in groups composing a piece of music to a given theme or mood. This is what we will be focusing and working on over the next number of weeks! This will teach the children about tempo, dynamics, pitch and so on.

The children have finished off their 6 week gymnastics programme in P.E. The children really did show a lot of progress in this short time which was great to see! Well done everyone.

Mrs. Brophy's 6th Class Report

February saw 6th Class cover a variety of topics across the curriculum. We are still reading our novel 'Goodnight Mr. Tom' and are thoroughly enjoying it. Although the story is very sad in parts, the relationship between Willie and Mr. Tom is beautiful. In Maths we studied 'area' and 'the circle'. We learnt about 'Pi π ' and all the different parts of a circle. In History we read about the 'Qing Dynasty' in China and heard about the 'Opium Wars' between England and China.

In Art we painted pictures of a battle in response to music and sketched our favourite seen from the novel. We also painted pictures from an atmospheric perspective. We are looking forward to an action packed month in March.

A Message from Fr. Finn

<u>Stop This World I Want to get off!</u> This phrase was very familiar in the early 1970's. It was an expression of the pressures that were beginning to be experienced by people as the world continued

to move on. If there had been somebody then who could have read the future, they might have said 'You Ain't seen Nothing Yet'.

Today, with the rapid motion of responsibilities, work, commitment, paying mortgages and rearing families, stress is becoming an everyday experience. The experience of trying to meet deadlines in work, in school, in sport can prevent us from having a quality experience in our life and in our relationships.
