We are also taking names of children who will be joining us in September 2020 and 2021.

Children from 2<sup>nd</sup> class upwards should be revising their 'Maths Tables' nightly also. Parents of children who are attending 'Homework Club' must also hear their child's reading, spellings and tables daily.

### Report from Ms. Lawlor's Junior and Senior Infants

This month the children have been learning all about people who help us in our community. Our role-play area was transformed into a Garda Station. The children went out in their garda car, arrested criminals, drew wanted posters, took fingerprints and filled in incident reports. The highlight of the month was definitely when a real garda came to visit us in our classroom. The children learned a lot about his job from him. The children were delighted to have many of their grandparents in to visit our classroom after mass on Grandparents' Day. It is such a special day for them and they love to show their grandparents all their work up on the wall.

## Report from Ms. Ormonde's 1<sup>st</sup>/2<sup>nd</sup> Class

January has been one of our most exciting months in  $1^{st}$  and  $2^{nd}$  class so far this year. Our Aistear theme this month was 'The Arctic.' We really loved learning about The Arctic, it was so interesting. We learned about the Inuit people who live in The Arctic, the different countries that are part of The Arctic and of course the animals who live there.

In English we were doing report writing. First, we used the iPads to research different animals and then we used these facts to create a report. You can see our reports on the Snowy Owl on display in the classroom.

In maths we were covering the topic 'length.' We were estimating whether objects would be around a meter, taller than a meter or shorter than a meter and then we did some measuring to compare our answers. We are getting so good at our doubles and near doubles and love our daily game 'around the world.'

Show and tell is also going great in our classroom. We have loved brining in our favourite objects to the classroom and showing them to our class. In SPHE we have started the Stay Safe programme and we talked about the different types of feelings we can have.

#### Report from Ms. Pitt's 3<sup>rd</sup>/4<sup>th</sup> Class

This month in geography we have been learning about a European country which is Italy. We learned about the capital city, many famous landmarks, popular Italian foods and many other facts about the country. The children have been eagerly working on their projects about Italy in their scrapbooks.

They used information they learned in class, information books and the internet to research information for their projects. They are going to present their projects to their class to share what they have learned.

In history we were learning about a time long ago which was the Stone Age era. We learned about how they farmed, what clothes they wore, the houses they lived in and what they ate. We also learned about the cave paintings and decorative jewellery they wore.

In science we learned about different states of matters that materials can be. We particularly focused on water and its changing states. We learned about how it can exist as a solid, liquid or gas. We discussed how it changes from one form to another.

## Report from Ms. Morrissey's 5th Class

This has been an extremely busy month with loads of interesting learning happening across the different subject areas. In English, we have been getting started on our new novel, Goodnight Mister Tom and doing lots of letter writing, poetry, drama and art ideas based on this. Children have been busy with project work which is also linked to the context of the novel, 'The Battle of Britain' during World War 2 being the focus.

In Maths the children have been working hard learning long division strategies and all things decimal. Keep up the good work everyone.

In Irish we have been looking at the topic of clothes and children's own personal style. The children have been using a lot of vocabulary to describe different costumes and outfits, even superhero and clown costumes. We also took part in a fashion show which helped children to use all their new language and phrases.

In Art children have been responding to some very descriptive war poems, creating masterpieces once again. Secondly, children have been working on construction techniques, creating small model Anderson bomb shelters just like during World War 2. We hope to add the finishing touches to them later this week, but they are really starting to take shape.

In SESE, we have been busy investigating in Science doing a range of experiments. This involved lots of predicting, discussion, investigating and sharing our findings.

In drama the children have gone back in time as war evacuees, taking on characters and also developing a small group drama based on a range of war images.

We have fit a lot of learning into this month and hopefully this work ethic will continue into the coming months.

## Report from Mrs. Brophy's 6<sup>th</sup> Class

It has been a busy start to 2019 in our class. In English we have begun our WW2 novel 'Goodnight Mr. Tom' and the children have been learning about the lives of evacuated children during this time in history. We have also been studying recount genre in our writing. In maths we spent the month learning about percentages. We focused on VAT, profit and loss and PCP. The children learnt about interest and how much goods can cost when bought over an extended period of time.

In history, we studied The Renaissance period and looked at famous people like Leonardo Da Vinci, Michelangelo and Shakespeare. Electricity was our theme for science and the children had the opportunity to make their own 'circuits' and light bulbs. They also examined 'static electricity'. I am looking forward to reading their 'Electric' projects next month.
