Our theme for March was spring and the farm. The children have been busy learning all about the different farm animals. They have also been learning about farm produce and our role play area has been transformed into a farm shop. They have to take turns at being the shopkeeper and they are doing this very nicely! We will continue on with this theme in for the first two weeks in April also.

In Science the children had a lot of fun making butter. They have been observing their daffodils and tulips growing outside. They also sowed potatoes, onions, strawberries and sunflowers! Our classroom tomatoes are coming on well too. We are learning about the farm in Irish too and the children are enjoying singing Old McDonald as Gaeilge!!

March has been a busy month, as always in 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> Class. We have been looking at the theme of 'food and farming' this month and we have been having so much fun exploring this theme. We have been doing the incredible edibles programme and we have been looking at food and how some food is natural and other food is processed. We went to the local shop and looked for the 'Bord Bia' mark on the food to ensure we are buying Irish food. We then sowed our own seeds and will hopefully see them start to grow in the next few weeks.

In P.E. we had a mixture of activities in March. As it was Seachtain na Gaeilge, we did some Irish dancing in the hall which we really enjoyed. We have also been practising our basketball skills this month and the kids have been improving each week.

# Ms. Pitt's 3<sup>rd</sup>/4<sup>th</sup> Class Report

This month we have been working with clay in art. Firstly we plan and sketch our idea based around a particular theme. One theme that we worked on was 'Spring'. We then used the clay to create a piece by using different shaping tools and rollers. We used matchsticks to support extra pieces of clay added on. Then the children painted the clay white and left it to dry before painting it the colour of their choice. Finally we coated it with PVA glue to seal and give it a shine.

In English this month we have been learning about persuasive writing. We read various persuasive writing pieces and have been practising writing persuasive letters. We will also will be doing some debating and writing speeches. We have recently finished our novel 'The Butterfly Lion' by Michael Morpurgo. The children thoroughly enjoyed reading the novel and are looking forward to doing another novel after Easter. We also did some drama activities about the novel; the children wrote their own conversations in role as different characters and acted them out for the class.

#### Ms. Morrissey's 5th Class Report

March has been our quickest month yet! We have been feeling very patriotic the past few weeks between St Patricks Day celebrations and learning about the 1798 Rebellion and the Battle of Vinegar Hill.

In Maths the children were investigating and learning a lot about the circle, area percentages. Keep up the good work everyone. The kids have been working very hard with their Irish this month

especially having learned how hard Irish people fought for this in our history. We learned the song 'Ireland's Call' which is sung at many important Irish rugby sporting events.

In Art, children had been learning how to draw Celtic knots, known as triquetras. These were quite challenging but the children did a super job on them! In History we are very much looking forward to our tour on Friday about the 1798 rebellion and Battle of Vinegar Hill which the children have been learning about in history the last few weeks!

#### Mrs. Brophy's 6th Class Report

This month was very busy in 6<sup>th</sup> Class. We finished reading our novel 'Goodnight Mr. Tom' and watched the movie also. We are currently study different types of poetry. To date we've looked at 'Limericks', 'Haiku', 'Kennings' and now 'Narrative/Ballad' in the form of 'The Lady of Shallot'. The children have written their own poetry also and published them for others to read.

In Maths we have been studying algebra, positive and negative numbers and equations. The children have been getting used to new terminology and rules e.g. minus  $\times$  minus = plus or plus  $\times$  minus = minus. In History we've been studying our local area and places of significant interest. Tomorrow we are going on a tour of Enniscorthy Castle, the 1798 Centre and Vinegar Hill which will bring this topic to a close.

The children have made several models (construction in art) of their place of choice in Wexford. We have Hook Head, Enniscorthy Castle and Vinegar Hill amongst the pieces of work. The children used materials such as cardboard, plastic and cloth materials to construct their object. They researched their building thoroughly prior to beginning the work. #### A Message from Fr. Finn

Easter is the highlight of the church's celebration. It is the foundation and the summit of our whole Christian belief. Christ rose from the dead. It is this significant factor that makes Christ totally different from all religious leaders, gurus and founders of different religious organisations.

The empty tomb is both symbolic and real. It stirred the apostles' imagination. It confused the Greeks and made the Romans suspicious.

There is enduring evidence (written letters, communications) from the Roman world, from local soldiers to the Senate in Rome that Christ rose from the dead. The Romans put this evidence across in a way that showed the culture of the Emperor being threatened. They claimed the Emperor was a God.

The Jesus Resurrection persisted and within 300 years had transformed the Roman Empire. So much so that Christianity became the official religion of the Empire. We teach the children the importance of Easter. So the celebrations of Holy Thursday night, Good Friday and Easter Saturday night are very important for the children to attend.
