As we look forward to the May Bank Holiday weekend and hopefully the beginning of a wonderfully warm summer, we have lots of exciting and informative news for you in this month's publication.

Our 2^{nd} Class are busy preparing for their First Holy Communion under the guidance of their teacher Ms. Ormonde and their parents. We wish them all the best for their big day and will keep them all in our thoughts and prayers. Thank you also to $3^{rd}/4^{th}$ Class and our choir mistress, Ms. Pitt, for all their hard work in preparing the hymns which will be performed at the First Holy Communion.

I realise that the beginning of the next school year is still some months away, but for those of you planning a family holiday, school shall re-open, after the summer break, on **Monday 2nd September** at 9.20am for all children. Our full calendar shall be issued with our next Newsletter and will also be on the school website. The school office shall be open from 9am on Thursday 29th August.

Booklists shall issue shortly. We shall be operating the book rental scheme again this year with a cost of $\[\epsilon 80 \]$ per child to include rented books, workbooks, school journal which the children will own and the annual fee for photocopying, arts and crafts.

Community Games

Well done to Oisín O'Connor who was a finalist in the recent Community Games handwriting competition.

Online Safety: our $5^{th}/6^{th}$ Class had a visit from Garda Sharon Dempsey from Enniscorthy station on 8^{th} April. Garda Dempsey spoke to the children about online safety and cyber bullying. She began by asking the children what social media sites were they using. Here are the answers she received:

She then spoke to the children about being aware of fake profiles which they may come across when gaming online. The topic of 'closed conversation - vanishing' also came up. The children were taught that all correspondence they do via social media platforms is owned by the company in question. There is nothing private online.

Garda Dempsey informed the children that the age of criminal responsibility in Ireland is 11 years. Should a child be accused of a crime e.g. bullying (cyber), assault, driving unlicensed or graffiti, then he/she can be arrested and charged.

The children learnt about the role of the JLO (Juvenile Liaison Officer) and Juvenile Caution. There is a children's court that sits in Gorey and Wexford weekly to deal with anyone less than 18 years of age.

Finally Garda Dempsey reminded the children about their responsibilities when online, being a good online citizen and she advised that every family should have a contract about acceptable internet use. Parents can access further information on this at wwww.safekids.com

Ms. Lawlor's Junior/Senior Infant Class Report

We continued with the same theme for April, spring and the farm. The children learned about the lifecycle of a chicken. We continue to watch out tomato plants grow on our window sill and we're looking forward to eating a few ripe tomatoes before the summer holidays!

For an art lesson the children made lovely bright sunflowers to brighten up our hallway. They are beautiful. We also read the story *Camille and the Sunflowers*, which tells the story of the artist Vincent Van Gogh.

In Irish we learned about the farm and Easter and the children really enjoyed our Easter egg hunt on the last day. During the month of May we will be learning about different types of transport with a focus on the airport.

Ms. Ormonde's 1st/2nd Class Report

First and Second Class have been continuing with the 'Incredible Edibles' programme this month. Previously we looked at the Bord Bia mark on the different fruits and vegetables in our local communities.

After this, with the help of Charlie, we started to grow some of our own potatoes and strawberries. We are looking forward to watching them grow. Another task with the incredible edibles programme was to create our own recipe and make it. Each Aistear group came up with a recipe and we had lots of fun making ice-cream Sundays and smoothies before we left for our Easter holidays.

Ms. Pitt's 3rd/4th Class Report

In science this month we were learning about magnetism. We had great fun predicting our results of our experiments and testing our theories. We ensured to make each experiment a fair test by ensuring that we had one variable. We did lots of investigations about magnets in class. We discovered what items around the classroom were magnetic and which were non-magnetic by testing them with the magnets.

Then we tested which magnet was the strongest magnet by using a variety of magnets and checking the distance from which it would attract the paper clip. We discovered that the large horseshoe magnet was the strongest magnet. We also did some investigating to see what materials the magnet could work through. We tested it through paper, copies, books, the desk, and glass in the door, bottles and other materials. We also learned about the north and south poles of the magnet and how they repel and attract.

Ms. Morrissey's 5th Class Report

It has been a very short and busy month for us this April in the run up to Easter Holidays! In maths, we have been learning a lot about decimals, percentages and fractions and how to convert them from one form to another. We have also been practising multiplying of decimal numbers.

In English we have been exploring the explanation writing genre! For Religion we have discussed and reflected on the events of Holy Week in the run up to Easter Sunday. Children sequenced and drew their comic 'Walking in the Footsteps of Jesus'. Fifth class have also been busy doing buddy reading the last number of weeks also with a buddy from 1^{st} and 2^{nd} class. This has been a great success so far!

Mrs. Brophy's 6th Class Report

April was a short teaching month, but the senior class still covered a lot of topics. This week we began to read our 3rd novel this year, 'Knights of the Borrowed Dark' by Dublin author Dave Rudden. It is very early days but so far the children seem to be enjoying it.

In maths we are beginning to revise some of the more challenging topics i.e. fractions, percentages and decimals. Our history theme for this month has been the American Civil War. The children have been learning about the issues between Yankees and Confederates. They have read about the slave trade, plantation life and some of the famous battles and people of the Civil War. They shall now work on their final project in primary school based on this history topic.

Gaeilge – as always we are working very hard on our Irish language skills. Táimid ag foghlaim an téama 'Aimsir (weather)'. We have been putting a lot of work into learning our grammar also. Our focus has been on the 'briathra rialta' (regular verbs) across the three tenses (Aimsir Caite – Past Tense), (Aimsir Láithreach – Present Tense) and (Aimsir Fháistineach – Future Tense).

SPHE - we had a visit from Garda Sharon Dempsey of Enniscorthy Station who spoke with 5^{th} and 6^{th} Class about cyber bullying and internet safety. Her talk with the children threw up some interesting topics:
