Garda Vetting – It is a legal requirement that any parents who wish to be involved in school activities e.g. Rackard League, Hurling 365 etc., must be Garda vetted through the school. We realise that many parents are already Garda vetted through the G.A.A and other organisations, but unfortunately, everybody still needs to go through the school vetting process. No Uniform Day on Fridays: This is voluntary but if children wear their own clothes, they are asked to donate €1 each to the school. Homework: Homework recommenced during the month of September for all classes except Junior Infants, who will start very soon. After much staff discussion, we decided to take a similar approach to last year, where we veered away from written homework for 1st class upwards. The reason for this is to ensure that children get enough time to focus on their reading and learning homework such as, English reading, Irish reading, spellings and tables. Maths homework is on Mangahigh for older classes, which is a fantastic resource that allows pupils to be challenged in an enjoyable way online. When children make use of the games and activities on Mangahigh, it has been proven to make a huge difference to their maths abilities. Junior and Senior Infants will still have a small amount of written work each evening, as well as their reading activities. We plan to survey parents about their thoughts on homework during the year, and then update our school 'Homework Policy' to reflect the feelings of pupils, staff and parents on the subject.

Morning Supervision- School gates do not open until 9.10am, and no pupils should be on the premises before this. Morning supervision is outdoors, and on wet days, children must wait in the shelter until school opens at 9.20am. Please ensure that adults who are dropping your kids to school take care to not pull in or turn opposite the school gates. I'd like to thank everyone for their co-operation since my last message on that subject.

Healthy Eating - Reminder that the school operates a 'healthy eating policy'. Children are allowed a small treat each Friday and we thank parents for their support in implementing this policy. This is available on our website 'www.ballymurnns.ie'

Primary Language Curriculum In-service Training

Parking- Please remember to park with care on the street outside the school. Do not double park or block access to staff cars. Please do not park in these spaces when dropping off or collecting your child from school. Please be conscious of how/where you park, taking the children's safety into account at all times.

Communication - Parents are reminded that if you have a concern/issue which you would like to raise with the school; you must make an appointment to speak to your child's teacher, through the school office.

In all cases we endeavour to deal with issues raised as promptly and fairly as possible. We will do our best to resolve any and every situation as far as is practicable.

Ms. Ormonde's Crescent Class

It has been effortless for them all to settle back into familiar routines with familiar peers and we have had a smooth sailing September! Our theme this month was 'school.' We spent time practising our oral language surrounding this theme, painting school bags in art, choosing school items from a feely bag and visiting all of the classrooms in our school to practise greeting all the teachers. We also got some lovely new sensory resources including our sensory jigsaw path which was a huge hit with everyone! We are looking forward to our 'buddy programme' which will start next week, where we will be inviting

different 5th & 6th class pupils down to our classroom every Friday to read, play games and spend some time with the pupils in the Crescent Class

Ms. O'Gorman's Junior Infant Report 🙂

We have had a wonderful September in Junior Infants this year. It's been a busy month, but I have to commend all the boys and girls who settled into school so well.

Aistear, is the methodology we use in schools for learning through play, otherwise known as 'playtime' each day. Our Aistear themes so far have been 'My Home and Family' and 'Autumn' everybody really enjoyed our stations which were: Role play, small world, art, messy play, water play, playdough and construction.

The children have been working on the theme of 'Mé Féin' in Irish, and have already learned lots of new phrases and some lovely songs. They are really enjoying the Bua na Cainte programme that we use. In Maths, we have commenced our Ready, Set, Go Maths programme, which has involved lots of practical activities learning about sets and one to one correspondence. We have been doing Literacy stations with Ms. Sheehan too, and this has involved lots of work on Phonologial Awareness and developing fine motor skills in preparation for reading and writing.

We've been learning all about similarities and differences between people in Science with Ms. O' Brien every Friday, and have also commenced learning about Autumn and the changes this season will bring. There have been some fabulous self-portraits done in Art, and we have learned lots of new playground games in P.E.

It has been a very productive first month in school!

Ms.Lawlor's Senior Infants and 1st Class Report 🙂

We've had a very busy September in Senior Infants and 1 st class! The children have started the year off with great enthusiasm to learn and they've been so quick to adapt to all the new classroom rules and routines. They are particularly enjoying station learning which happens 3 times a week. We have English and maths stations where the children work in small groups with a teacher. They have also enjoyed using the tablets to play some educational games during this time.

The children in Senior Infants are reading the new Jolly Phonics scheme in our school. These books tie in with the sounds they are revising. 1 st class are reading on with the Jolly Phonics and Oxford Tree schemes and are doing great with these books. Every morning the 1 st class pair up with a Senior Infant to listen to their reading, practise blending sounds and revise tricky words. Lots of practise will help the children to read more fluently.

Our Aistear theme for the month was Myself and my family. The children have been exploring this theme through construction, small world, plasticine, art and role-play stations. Each day the child visits a different station. We can practise our Irish, writing, maths and lots more through this type of play. The role-play area has been a family home. Each month I will upload some photos on our school's Facebook page and hopefully the children will take some photos of their work to upload to Seesaw from time to time. Ms. Boggan's 2nd and 3rd Class Report 🙂

2nd and 3rd class have settled in really well and have been working very hard. We've had a busy month learning lots of new things.

In maths we have been busy learning about place value, addition, time and angles. Time was one of the trickier topics that we have been working on this year; we did lots of practice in class with the clocks, telling the digital and analogue times. I would encourage all of the children to practise telling the time at home as much as possible too. We've also been busy revising the addition and subtraction tables.

In English we have been reading the novel 'Witches' by Don Conroy, we've been practising reading individually, in groups and in different tones of voices. The children have enjoyed reading about the adventures of the witches in the story. We have also been learning about the features of recount writing, how to structure the piece using an orientation, sequence of events and conclusion, and its grammatical features. We will be doing lots of recount writing in the coming weeks.

In Irish we've been working on the topic of 'Mé Féin' (myself). The children have been learning to ask and answer lots of questions as Gaeilge such as what their name is, their age, their hair colour, their eye colour, how many are in their family and how many brothers and sisters they have. They've been doing great work on forming sentences as Gaeilge about what they see on the poster. They've also been learning a song 'Mo Bhreithlá' and a poem 'An tOchtapas'.

In music we've been learning lots of new songs for 'Sing Out Loud', there's some fantastic medleys such as a noughties medley, Matilda medley and pop medley. The children are really enjoying the songs and 3 rd class are looking forward to their performance in November.

Mrs. Brophy's 4th/5th Class Report 🙂

September has been a very busy month in our classroom. Firstly we welcomed to new children, Charlie and Jamie and we are delighted to have them with us. All the children have been working very hard since their return to school.

In Maths we have studied Place Value, Operations and we are currently learning about Data. We are having great fun designing bar graphs, line graphs, trend graphs and pie charts. In English we've begun our first novel 'There's a Boy in the Girls' Bathroom' by Louis Sachar. This novel focuses on a boy named Bradley Chalkers who is struggling socially in school. He is learning how to communicate better and work with his peers in a kinder way. We are really enjoying the story so far.

In Gaeilge we have been working the on theme 'Mé Féin' (myself) and learning how to introduce ourselves and to talk about our families in simple terms. History saw us learning about The Reformation and we are busy working on our project on this topic. We are using our ICT skills on the tablets to carry out our research.

In Geography we are learning about Ireland's counties, provinces and most northerly and southerly points. We also learnt about industry going from using raw materials to the finished product. We shall begin to learn about our heart and how it functions in Science class shortly. Finally, we are busy practicing for our 'Sing Out Loud' event which shall take place in November. That will be such a fun night for all of us.

Ms. Morrissey's 5th/6th Class Report 🙂

I am thrilled with all of the positives that have come out of 5th and 6th class in September. They have set the bar high and have been working extremely hard.

In Maths we have been doing lots of work on place value and the main operations of addition, subtraction, multiplication and division. We have had a more specific focus on looking at the language of maths and seeing what clues are there in word problems to decide on which operation we need to use. Students have been growing in confidence doing this and have also been working in pairs to solve our weekly challenges. Well done everyone!

In English we have been working really hard at upskilling and improving our writing, using checklists to monitor our written work and have also started a new class novel called Holes by Louis Sachar. This is a very unusual and interesting story about a boy who is wrongfully sent to a detention centre for young boys out in the middle of the desert. We have started our reading stations again which involve a great mix of reading, writing and comprehension activities.

In Irish we have been learning about Mé Féin (Myself) this month. We have been busy chatting in pairs and asking each other all about ourselves, learning loads of new words and phrases, and working really well on our Irish reading. The students have impressed me with their work ethic especially with the verbs and gramma this month! Maith sibh, iontach ar fad!

We have also been learning about North America this month with a particular view on famous landmarks, native people, indigenous animals, different climates and geographical regions/features. This combines both history and geography as we have been looking a lot at the map pf North America while also going back in time to the time of the first native settlers, the Native Americans.

We are all thrilled to be back practising for Sing Out Loud so that has been the main music focus so far, but we also learned a favourite song of mine in Irish called An Peigín Litir Mór. They seemed to enjoy it as much as I did!

In art this month we have been working on a project called 'Our Selfie Self Portraits'. They are almost complete and I cannot wait to share them with you. Children have been working really hard on these and have taken a number of weeks. I won't say too much more just yet! We have also been getting to know how to use charcoal pencils, to blend and shade which the children have gotten really confident with as they found it very messy to begin with!

I couldn't be happier with how the students have settled in and am looking forward to the next month!
